## Response

Document the explanation of the bruise


Log all injuries on a body map.

Be open and honest with the parents about your concerns unless you are concerned that the child may be at further risk

Advise the parents of the need to make a referral to Children's Social Care with a view to an urgent examination by a paediatrician

## BRUISING IN NON MOBILE CHILDREN

ASSESSMENT – Cause for concern?

- The explanation of the bruise may be inconsistent, vague or not compatible with the injury or there may be no explanation at all.
- 2. There may be a delay in seeking medical help or no help at all.
- 3. Ask when the bruising was first noticed
- 4. Critically consider the age and developmental ability
- 5. Any background safeguarding information?

It is recognised that only a small percentage of bruising in non-mobile babies will have an innocent explanation E.g. a medical cause

Bruising cannot be accurately aged from an assessment of colour – from either a clinical assessment or a photograph.

Bruising is the commonest presenting feature of physical abuse in children.

Bruising is strongly related to mobility.

Bruising in a child who is not yet crawling is very unusual and should prompt suspicion of maltreatment.

Remember hidden harm when any child present with a bruise. Child protection medical investigations will explore this further.
